Fauna & Flora

At Fauna & Flora, our shared purpose is to protect the diversity of life on Earth, for the survival of the planet and its people. We work closely with local conservation partners around the world to save nature, together. We harness this collective expertise to inspire positive change globally.

Wildlife Trade Team

Fauna & Flora has been at the forefront of efforts to tackle unsustainable and illegal wildlife trade for almost two decades. Our team's practical, field-based approach revolves around putting in place effective measures on the ground to safeguard wild populations of key species from poaching for illegal trade.

There are multiple strands to Fauna & Flora's approach to this complex global issue, but they all involve working closely with our established regional programmes and network of in-country partners to ensure that our interventions are appropriate to the local context and sustainable in the long term. We engage communities as active and motivated partners in species protection and law enforcement, not least by strengthening community rights and helping to ensure that they have a vested interest in safeguarding wildlife. We work with governments, law enforcers and judiciary to build capacity for law enforcement and prosecution, seeking to ensure that this is supported by those living closest to wildlife. We promote leadership and aim to provide a platform for local voices to influence policy and wildlife legislation. We believe that smarter enforcement, not just tougher enforcement, is more effective in preventing crime in the longer term and are working to implement evidence-based approaches, including building on insights from conservation criminology and behavioural science. We focus on strategic long-term partnerships and collaborations with the institutions, groups and individuals who can have a significant influence on wildlife trade, either as consumers, businesses, policy makers, law enforcers or community leaders.

You will be joining a highly skilled and supportive team of five individuals who work closely with our global network to provide expertise in delivering robust approaches to understanding and preventing unsustainable and illegal wildlife trade across Fauna & Flora's project sites and partner network. We are having a direct impact on the ground in Africa, the Americas & Caribbean, Asia-Pacific and Eurasia as well as shaping global policy and innovating on approaches to addressing unsustainable and illegal wildlife trade.

The Opportunity

The internship would be an opportunity for an individual to gain experience of working on projects to tackle illegal and unsustainable wildlife trade, with a focus on our Combating Wildlife Trafficking Activity project in the Caribbean.

This role provides an opportunity to enhance your quantitative and qualitative research skills by investigating online wildlife trade to support projects. You will be trained to conduct online market surveys and report findings for key reptile species in the Caribbean. You may also have the opportunity to learn about other wildlife trade data sources such as physical market surveys, literature reviews, interview data or CITES analysis to help research new and emerging issues.

There will be opportunities to learn from and network with Fauna & Flora's wildlife trade project teams globally, to collate findings from market surveys across our projects. There will be a chance to engage with other NGOs working on the topic to understand best practice approaches to investigating online wildlife trade.

You will also have the opportunity to present back your findings and create communications outputs to promote our work through our internal platforms.

Skills gained would include quantitative and qualitative data analysis, reporting, presentation experience, communication skills and you would gain learning and exposure to many of our wildlife trade projects.

Note that this internship has been designed to create a professional development opportunity for people who are new to the conservation sector. Therefore, applicants should have less than two years' paid or unpaid experience in the conservation sector (not including academic work).

- Conduct online market survey to assess illegal wildlife trade of key reptile species from the Caribbean
- Present to Fauna & Flora on lessons learnt throughout the internship and create communications outputs to promote our work through our internal platforms.
